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Executive Summary

The Puerto Rico Office of Management and Budget (OGP as per the acronym in Spanish) has the objective of creating an Office for Federal Grants Management, as an instrument to evaluate the concerns, and implement the recommendations associated with the effective use of federal funds, set forth by the President's Task Force on Puerto Rico of March 2011. This office will assist in the identification of new grant opportunities and will provide oversight on federal funds use, support capacity building initiatives, assure compliance and promote the effective use of funds, to optimize economic development opportunities in the Island.

As part of this effort, Estudios Técnicos, Inc. was commissioned a study on the federal funds awarded to Puerto Rico for fiscal year (FY) 2010. The objective of this analysis is to compare the Island's performance, in terms of its participation in grant programs, particularly competitive (project) grants and the amount of funds awarded, with that of the 50 states and to develop strategic recommendations to allow the Commonwealth to identify and size opportunities within the grants portfolio. Moreover, the study includes a ranking system that identifies top competitive grant programs¹, as to estimate which programs Puerto Rico had no participation for FY 2010. The study was developed using official federal sources of information regarding federal funds, such as the Consolidated Federal Funds Report (CFFR) for FY 2010 and the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) to allow comparison with other jurisdictions.

The research showed inherent limitations on the data available to measure the magnitude of opportunities for additional funds from federal grant programs. However, the methodology developed for this report allowed to identify certain gaps in terms of participation and funds received, particularly in competitive grant programs.

The Commonwealth does not participate in the same magnitude, nor does it have a diversified set of federal grant programs, as other jurisdictions. Nonetheless, the study showed that Puerto Rico is not in the same level playing field in terms of access to available federal grant programs.

The evaluation of federal funds obligations for FY 2010 indicates that Puerto Rico did not take advantage of all the discretionary (project) federal grants, that were available and awarded funds in FY 2010 and that the Island may be eligible to apply for. Opportunities were identified in the Environmental Quality, Natural Resources, Transportation and Community Development categorical functions. According to the CFDA, Puerto Rico may have access to 47 additional project grant programs. Thus, in those instances where the Commonwealth is able to participate, there is an opportunity for improvement.

The areas of opportunity will depend from the convergence of the priorities of both the federal government and the Commonwealth. However, local endowments and the local federal fund infrastructure could be improved as to assure a better maximization of federal funds. Such endeavor could provide for a greater opportunity to capture future funds. Since opportunities are mostly concentrated in competitive grants, an emphasis should be placed on improving the capabilities of the local private sector and the local government.

In addition, the report provides a proxy variable which suggests that the Commonwealth was unable to maximize the use of federal funds for 2010. For instance, according to the CFFR 2010, grant programs awarded to Puerto Rico reflect deobligations² of \$18,254,582, of which \$11,565,794 corresponds to competitive grant programs. In terms of deobligations, per CFFR, Puerto Rico is in second place. Florida is in first place with deobligations of \$42,429,548 for 2010, which represents 1% of grants received. South Carolina (\$15,265,623), Delaware (\$7,437,006), and Hawaii (\$7,426,523) complete the top five.

Deobligations are downward adjustments of the obligations recorded in a prime contract or assistance award. It is caused by factors such as (1) termination of a part of the project, (2) return of unspent funds, or (3) correction of reported amounts (USAspending.gov).



Given that deobligations may be affected by further corrections to the reported amounts and the termination of projects, this analysis does not provide sufficient data to corroborate the task force's statement regarding the untimely expenditure of federal funds. Thus, a deeper examination of local agencies expenditures and administering agencies recaptures of funds needs to be undertaken.

General findings

- □ Although there are various sources of information regarding federal funds, there are discrepancies on the information reported. Also, data available to determine Puerto Rico's grant program eligibility is not consistent, which presents a bigger challenge for the Commonwealth to identify and take advantage of new funding opportunities.
- □ States and jurisdictions received \$5,024 billion in federal funds in FY 2010, of which Puerto Rico received \$29,121 million.
- □ In terms of the distribution of grant funds by type of program, states in the overall received a total of \$670,700³ million in 2010. Non-competitive programs funds represented 65%, while competitive grants comprised 30%. The remaining 5% is distributed among cooperative agreements, direct payments and other programs.
- Puerto Rico receives most of its federal assistance from direct payments for individuals (\$12,336 million), which includes Social Security and Medicare payments, and grants (\$6,313 million). Insurance, such as life insurance for veterans and flood insurance, is in third place with \$5,605 million. Puerto Rico receives 32% of its grant funds from competitive grant programs, ranking 49 out of 51 jurisdictions, in terms of participation

For FY 2010 grant obligations added up to \$683,361 million. For this analysis, the District of Columbia, and the territories of American Samoa, Fed. States of Micronesia, Guam, Marshall Islands, Northern Marianas, Palau, and the US Virgin Islands were excluded.



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in competitive grant programs. This suggests that there is an area of opportunity for Puerto Rico to receive additional funding through project grants.

- □ The difference between Puerto Rico and the tendency of the states is partly due to the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (PAN, as per the acronym in Spanish), which is classified as a grant for Puerto Rico, not direct payment as elsewhere, and awarded \$2,272 million in 2010.
- □ For FY 2010, the states received an average of \$2,352 in federal funds per capita, of which 33% derived from competitive grants⁴. The states with the highest per capita obligations in grants were Alaska, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Vermont and Wyoming.
- Per capita grant obligations for Puerto Rico (\$1,695) is considerably lower when compared with that of the states; this ranks the Island at number 47. If the PAN is excluded from the grant analysis, Puerto Rico will be ranked in last place, with a per capita grant obligation of \$1,084.
- □ Without considering the PAN, 61% of Puerto Rico grants per capita derives from noncompetitive programs, while 24% are competitive grants. Since the majority of federal grant obligations for Puerto Rico in FY 2010 derive from formula grants, it can be inferred that the limited amount of awards from project-based allocations could be one the explanations for the difference between the average per capita amount of federal funds of the states and that of Puerto Rico.
- □ Per the CFFR, federal grants obligations for Puerto Rico (excluding PAN funds) are concentrated in the Department of Health and Human Services (32%) and the Department of Education (20%). In terms of competitive grants Department of Health

Per Capita is used as a measure to compare the obligations awarded by States and Programs. The Per Capita by states and Puerto Rico was calculated using the population determined in the CFFR for FY 2010. The Per Capita by program was calculated by adding the obligation received per participating state divided by the total population of the participating states.



and Human Services and the Department of Transportation managed 61% of funds awarded.

Based on CFFR 2010, Puerto Rico did not participate in 118 of the top⁵ competitive programs that awarded an average of \$1,000 million per state. This might represent additional funding opportunities, although there may be some eligibility limitations to access some programs.

Background

On March 2011, the President's Task Force on Puerto Rico's Status issued a report with findings and recommendations on measures to promote social and economic development. Capacity building and the proper use of Federal Funds were some of the main recommendations. As to the above, the Task Force report points out the following⁶:

- Puerto Rican governmental and nonprofit entities are not applying for, seeking, or competing for Federal funds in areas where resources might be available.
- ☐ Second, significant amounts of Federal funds available to the Island are not being spent in a timely fashion.
- Third, while the Federal Government is engaged with Puerto Rico in a variety of ways, Federal agencies generally do not coordinate with each other in their work on the Island.

To address the challenges, the Puerto Rico Office of Management and Budget (OGP, as per the acronym in Spanish) is conducting an assessment to clearly define and quantify the implications

and opportunities associated to the Task Force's findings. The OMB proposes to establish a centralized office which will provide oversight on federal fund use and support capacity building initiatives, among other. The purpose is to increase efficiency and effectiveness in the administration of federal funds, and ultimately support economic development. A key task of the proposed office will be to standardize various financial and administrative aspects to support and strengthen the Commonwealth's federal grant management capacity.

This report was prepared to support OGP's initiatives. It provides relevant information to define the opportunities that may be pursued by the proposed Office of Federal Funds Management. The objective is to provide a general overview of the Federal grants-in-aid in Puerto Rico, by analyzing federal grants distribution by type, categorical function, and federal agency. It also evaluates Puerto Rico's performance compared to that of states by reviewing various indicators, such as the level of participation in federal competitive grant programs, amounts awarded and de-obligations, as defined in the next sections. In addition, develop strategic recommendations in order to maximize opportunities to obtain additional federal funds, such as increasing private sector participation and diversifying federal programs portfolio to increase the social impact of federal grant funds.

General Overview of Federal Funds

<u>Challenges</u>

The main instrument of the Federal government to implement policies and national objectives has been the Federal Domestic Assistance Program, also known as Federal Grants Program or federal cash assistance programs. These programs transfer money, property, services, or other items of value for which the principal purpose is to accomplish a goal authorized by Congress (Keegan, 2012).



Federal grant programs provide a tool for federal policymakers to promote their programmatic priorities at the state and local levels by influencing the amount of money spent and the types of activities on which state and local governments spend their money (CBO 2013). Additionally, the objective of federal grants awarded to state and local governments is to encourage experimentation and innovation that cannot be achieved in programs that are uniformly implemented by the federal government (CBO 2013).

These assistance programs are administered by 26 federal agencies that manage different programs, which include grants, loans, loan guarantees, scholarships, mortgage loans, insurance, and other types of financial assistance- including cooperative agreements, property, technical assistance, counseling, statistical, and other expert information and service activities of regulatory agencies (CFDA, 2010).

The Federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB) highlights three key areas when determining how the federal funds will be allocated and distributed:

- 1) the parameters that govern how recipients may spend federal grant funds
- 2) allocation methods for those funds among state and local government recipients
- 3) how much to spend on grants, and how to set the rules that determine allowable use of funds

Once funding decisions are made, then Congress appropriates amounts to fund each federal grant program. The administering agencies are then responsible for the award and oversight of the grants. This is the beginning of the grant funding stream process that is illustrated in the following diagram.

Although the above process is quite straight forward, the large number of authorized grant programs available for the United States and Puerto Rico has created a complex system of rules and procedures applicable to each program, which requires specialized human resources and adequate systems to handle them effectively. Procedures associated to the application process, as well as administrative and compliance rules are as broad as the large number of programs available. As of November 2013, 2,205 congressionally authorized Federal Domestic Assistance Programs were registered in The Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA)⁷. This complexity is forcing states to implement initiatives that promote the effective use of federal aid, in particular capacity building programs.

⁷ The CFDA is a government-wide compendium of Federal programs, projects, services, and activities that provide assistance or benefits to the American public. This database managed by the General Services Administration (GSA) since 1984, contains financial and nonfinancial assistance programs administered by departments and establishments of the Federal government.



Federal aid is a key instrument for the economic development of Puerto Rico. Therefore, the effective use of federal funds is a priority of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, particularly given the economic and social challenges affecting the Island. During 2010, Puerto Rico received \$29,121 million in federal funds, of which \$6,313 million were grants⁸. In terms of the amount of federal funds, relative to the size of Puerto Rico's economy, such funds represent almost 42% of the Island's GNP. This places Puerto Rico in the 7th position within the top ten states with the highest proportion of federal funds to GDP⁹. In terms of the proportion of grants to the relative size of the economy, Puerto Rico ranks first (9.1%), when compared to the states¹⁰.




Figure 2: Distribution of the Federal Funds Awarded to Puerto Rico for FY 2010

The figure of Puerto Rico is presented in terms of GNP since the Island's GDP figure could potentially overstate the real size of the economy.

According to the Task Force's findings, the Island can increase its participation in federal funds. However, the rising availability of programs, their fragmentation and complexity present challenges, not just to the Commonwealth, but also to units of local government and nonprofit organizations. Identifying and applying for federal grants, as well as complying with all applicable, laws, rules and procedures requires strengthening the local capacity to manage a growingly complex system (GAO, 2011).

According to the Government Accountability Office's (GAO) analysis developed for all states, some state agencies have not performed thorough reviews of the recipient's capacity to carry out programs before awarding a grant. GAO also found that, in some cases, grant programs lacked sufficient oversight and monitoring, contributing to improper payments in some of the programs that awarded grants to state and local governments (CBO, 2013).

Thus, previous to any effort to capture additional federal funds, the Commonwealth should consider the agencies' local endowments, and their capacity to undertake, additional federal resources. Since most federal funds have matching requirements and limits to their use, the state local needs and priorities must be taken into account. In other words, there is an intrinsic cost to the management of federal funds, which must be absorbed by the recipient state.

Federal Agencies and Offices

As of November 2013, the CFDA published detailed program descriptions for 2,205 Federal assistance programs, for which five agencies managed 56% of all the Federal programs. The following figure illustrates the distribution of these programs¹¹ by issuing agencies.

Although the CFDA is the single authoritative, government-wide compendium and source document for descriptions of federal programs that provide assistance or benefits to the public, a simple tally of the CFDA database will not provide an accurate count of the number of federally funded grant programs. This is due to a number of reasons. First, according to GSA officials, there is not a one-to-one relationship between individual grant program opportunities and overarching CFDA programs. Multiple grant programs can trace their legal authority back to a single CFDA program description and CFDA number. Also, CFDA programs contain broader objectives than individual grant opportunities. Second, not all of the programs listed in the CFDA have current appropriations. CFDA is a catalog containing active funded and inactive non-funded programs which have been archived at an agency's request. Third, as per officials from GSA, each agency

Federal Grant Lifecycle

The grant lifecycle describes the stages of a grant from its creation until its closing.




Figure 4. Federal Grant Life Cycle

determines how to organize and describe their programs for publication in the CFDA, as long as the agency adheres to the underlying requirement to describe the program's legal authority, administering office, funding, purpose, benefits, and beneficiaries (GAO, 2012).



Typically, the lifecycle of a grant comprises four main stages: (1) the pre-award, (2) grant award, (3) grant program administration and implementation, and (4) post-award/audit (Keegan, 2012). During the pre-award stage, federal agencies determine the grant distribution method, this is, determine formula amounts for formula grants or establish the criteria for competitive grant.

- Usually the award period is twelve-months, but it varies from program to program, and even within the same program. In some cases the grants have multiyear award periods depending on availability of funding. Is important to keep in mind that the award period does not necessarily equals the spending period, thus, some grants require more than a calendar year to spend the complete allocation.
- ☐ The grant program administration stage begins once the grant has been formally awarded through a signed agreement. This phase comprises reviewing activities, changes in the scope of work, and assessing financial and overall compliance.
- ☐ The grant post-award/audit stage includes compliance with reporting and audit requirements, as established by the laws and regulations applicable to each program, such as the Single Audit Act (Pub. Law 98-502, as amended).

Description and types of federal programs

The increasing number, apparent fragmentation, and complexity of federal grants have resulted in a lack of definitions that clearly differentiate the various types of federal programs (Keegan, 2012). In addition, programs integrate multiple criteria related funds award, utilization, conditions on spending, compliance and reporting, and other requirements.

For instance, federal programs in the CFFR 2010 are classified based on the type of assistance they provide or government expenditures, including: Retirement and disability, other direct payments, grants, procurement contracts, salaries and wages, direct loans, guaranteed loans



and insurance. In the CDFA, main categories are: retirement and disability, other direct payments, grants, procurement contracts, salaries and wages, direct loans, guaranteed or insured loans, and insurance.

Thus, a standard approach was used to compile the required data for the analysis. For the purposes of the study, only those programs classified as grants in the CFFR were analyzed.

According to the CBO, the most frequent classification used within the federal government is block grants and categorical grants, which are based on how grants can be spent and decisions from the federal government on how funds would be allocated. In 1972, congress authorized the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act, (P.L. 92-512) which established a new type of Federal program to provide financial assistance to State and local governments-the general revenue sharing program, until their expiration in 1986 (Keegan, 2012).

Block grants, though not widely used, are grant programs authorized for broad purposes, and afford state and local government's substantial control over spending decisions. Distribution of the block grants is determined using formula-based allocation. On the other hand, categorical grants are federal programs that are authorized for intently defined purposes and are distributed through formula-based allocation or a competitive process (CBO, 2013).

Categorical grants are further divided into formula grants and project grants based on the distribution methodology and the grant's administrative requirements imposed on the recipient (CBO, 2013). This is the most relevant classification for Puerto Rico, since competitive grants comprise possible additional funding opportunities.

Although grant programs generally include rules and guidelines that determine the types of activities on which the funds can be spent, recipients usually determine the specific projects that receive funding. Therefore, grants also classified as conditional and unconditional grants according to the level of discretion of the administering agency. Conditional grants have the highest level of federal agency monitoring and supervision.

In some cases, grant programs may include both, a formula and competitive allocation methodology with appropriated funds apportioned to each grant type. In addition, cooperative agreements may also have a project grant classification (GAO, 2013).

Sources of Information

As mentioned above there are several sources of information on federal programs and expenditures. This section presents and defines the main traits of federal data sources used in this report¹².

Consolidated Federal Funds Report 2010 (CFFR 2010) and Federal Aid to States Report (FAS 2010)

The Consolidated Federal Funds Report (CFFR 2010) and the Federal Aid to States Report (FAS 2010) summarize geographic distribution of federal grant funds to states and counties, and were the primary documents used to track federal spending. These reports were first published in 1983. The CFFR and FAS reports were last issued in FY 2010, due to the termination of Federal Financial Statistics program, effective for the FY 2012 budget.

Both reports contained summary data for states and aggregate figures by federal department and agency. The CFFR includes payments to state and local governments and payments to private recipients. The CFFR combines the Catalog of Federal Domestic Aid (CFDA) and the

Other sources include: 1) Grants.gov is a public website that provides information of the available Federal grant funding opportunities, at the grant level. The website was established as a requirement of the Federal Financial Assistance Management Improvement Act of 1999 (FFAMIA, Pub. L. 106-107). 2) System for Award Management (SAM) combines federal procurement systems and CFDA into one new system. The overarching benefits of SAM include streamlined and integrated processes, elimination of data redundancies, and reduced costs while providing improved capability.



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Federal Award Data System to determine the federal obligations¹³, deobligations and expenditures that comprise the grant category.

The amounts reported in CFFR do not necessarily represent actual expenditures, since obligations from one period may not result in outlays¹⁴ during that period. The FAS includes federal outlays or expenditures, only for grants allocated to state and local governments. The definitions applied for grants in the FAS are aligned with the federal budget and exclude grants assigned to profit and nonprofits institutions, and individuals.

Nowadays USA.spending.gov (described below), has become the primary source of data on the distribution of federal grant funds (Keegan, 2012).

Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA)

As mentioned before, the CFDA is a government-wide compendium of federal programs, projects, services, and activities that provide assistance or benefits to the American public. The Catalog is traditionally used to track historic information on federal programs such as program types, requirements, rules and regulations, eligibility, among others. The Catalog is the main point of reference in the realm of federal assistance, through the use a unique identification or catalog number for each program.



An obligation is a definite commitment that creates a legal liability of the government for payment of goods and services ordered or received. An agency incurs an obligation, for example, when it awards a grant. (GAO, 2013).

Outlay means a payment to liquidate an obligation (other than the repayment of debt principal or other disbursements that are "means of financing" transactions). Outlays generally are equal to cash disbursements, but also are recorded for cash-equivalent transactions, such as the issuance of debentures to pay insurance claims, and in a few cases are recorded on an accrual basis such as interest on public issues of the public debt. Outlays are the measure of government spending. (GAO, 2013).

Although the CFDA is the single authoritative, government-wide compendium and source document for descriptions of federal programs that provide assistance or benefits to the public, a simple tally of the CFDA database will not provide an accurate count of the number of federally funded grant programs (GAO 2012).

Federal Award Data System (FAADS)

The Federal Assistance Award Data System was a quarterly report of financial assistance awards that compiled data submitted by federal government agencies. This data was the source for most of the statistics published in the CFFR. For fiscal year 2010, CFFR derived data from the FAADS by summing the quarterly reports that covered financial assistance awarded between October 1, 2009, and September 30, 2010. The report includes most (but not all) grants, direct payments to individuals and others, insurance, and loans. All CFFR data not obtained through the FAADS are otherwise obtained from federal agencies (CFFR, 2011).

USAspending.gov

In 2006, the Federal Congress passed the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA). This Act required the OMB to establish a free publicly accessible website containing data on federal awards (USAspending.gov). This site provides information on federal award obligations and deobligations, including the recipient's name, funding agency, amount of award, and descriptive title.

USAspending.gov allows users to access a database that contains specific information regarding the grant transactions reported by the federal agencies and other sources. This database includes various fields which allow identifying the jurisdiction related to program implementation. These fields include: place of performance, primary recipient state, and primary recipient country.

The USAspending.gov website relies primarily on data submitted by Federal agencies and, to some extent, by recipients. Therefore, draws data from different data sources, as shown in the figure below.

Comparison of sources

A comparative analysis of the sources of information was developed. Results show that grant classification is not consistent among sources, as shown in the following table.

As shown in the table above, there is a difference of \$1,044 million between grant obligations for FY 2010 in the CFFR and USAspending.gov. A substantial portion of the difference is caused by: 1) the PAN program and 2) the *Treasury Payment to Puerto Rico- Return of Taxes and*

USAspending.gov had \$3,043,934,577 categorized as grants. For purposes of this report we added \$2,225,309,119 from direct payments, considered as grants by CFFR 2010, including the PAN.



Customs Duties Collected¹⁶. Also, differences may be caused by the timing of the issuance of the repots. For instance, the CFFR 2010 report presents data as of September 2011, while USAspending is constantly updated. Furthermore, federal grant obligations reported in the CFFR are not necessarily actual outlays or expenditures, another reason for the discrepancies with amounts reported in USAspending. These differences are related to the program approval proves summarized below.

The difference between amounts reported in USAspending.gov and OGP is mostly due to classification between grants and direct payments. 112 programs were identified that OGP considers grants, but are reported as direct payments in USAspending.gov. The rest is due to differences in the amounts reported. The Appendix section includes a list of the 112 programs.

The President proposes the annual Budget for how he would like to allocate funding to various programs

Congress appropriates funds trough the annual appropriation legislations; these appropriations are final when the President signs the legislation(s)

Federal Agencies make award obligations to recipients in the form of contracts, grants, loans, etc.

Funds actually expended by Federal Agencies are reported as "Federal Expenditures" (SF 133)

Funds are transferred to the award recipient (outlays) by the Federal Agencies through the U.S. Treasury.

Data reported in the CFFR 2010, also differs from the data collected by OGP. Most of the differences are essentially caused by the reporting party. For instance, data from OGP is directly derived from the information provided by local agencies, while CFFR data comes from the federal administering agencies.

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Operational Definitions

As mentioned above, there are several categories for federal government expenditures. For the purposes of this report, a methodology was developed to cluster into 6 groups —or CFDA categories— the 1,346 grant programs listed in the CFFR, as shown in the diagram below. Nonetheless, of those programs, 186 are considered as other types of assistance (direct payments for specified use, direct payments with unrestricted uses, direct loans, guaranteed/insured loans and insurance) according to the CFDA, but for this analysis they are considered grants, as defined in the CFFR. The programs that were not listed in the Catalog were classified using USA.Spending.gov.




Figure 7. Diagram of Grants Classification Based on Methodology

This report is based on the following operational definitions:



□ **Non-Competitive Grants** – These include formula grants and block grants.

Formula Grants – Represent allocations of money to states or their subdivisions in accordance with distribution formulas prescribed by law or administrative regulation, for activities of a continuing nature not confined to a specific project. In some cases, the formulas may also provide a minimum allocation for each state, if the amount apportioned by the formula is less than a minimum threshold established in statute.

Block Grant - Grants programs authorized for broad purposes and usually allow for greater flexibility in its management.

- □ **Cooperative Agreements** Type of assistance, similar to a grant, but requires a greater degree of involvement from the federal awarding agency in the program implementation.
- □ Project (competitive) Grants The funding, for fixed or known periods, of specific projects. Project grants can include fellowships, scholarships, research grants, training grants, traineeships, experimental and demonstration grants, evaluation grants, planning grants, technical assistance grants, survey grants, and construction grants.

Discretionary or project grants comprise the majority of the federal grants programs; however funding is generally limited when compared with formula grants. These are grants, commonly known as competitive grants, are assigned to a predetermined timeframe and set of eligible activities.

Direct Payments

Direct Payments for Specified Use - Financial assistance from the federal government provided directly to individuals, private firms, and other private institutions to encourage or subsidize a particular activity by conditioning the receipt



of the assistance on a particular performance by the recipient. This does not include solicited contracts for the procurement of goods and services for the federal government.

Direct Payments with Unrestricted Use - Financial assistance from the federal government provided directly to beneficiaries who satisfy federal eligibility requirements with no restrictions being imposed on the recipient as to how the money is spent. This category includes payments under retirement, pension, and compensatory programs.

Other Programs

Direct Loans - Financial assistance provided through the lending of federal monies for a specific period of time, with a reasonable expectation of repayment. Such loans may or may not require the payment of interest.

Guaranteed/Insured Loans Programs – loan programs in which the federal government makes an arrangement to identify a lender against part or all of any defaults by those responsible for repayment of loans.

Insurance - Financial assistance provided to assure reimbursement for losses, such as flooding insurance.

Federal Grants Functional Categories

Grant programs are authorized by Congress on an annual basis and provide a wide range of benefits and services, which are grouped by the CFDA into 20 basic functional categories, and 176 subcategories that are linked to public policy goals.

Methodology

Data Gathering

The primary source of information regarding program participation and grant obligations by jurisdiction was the CFFR 2010. However, the analysis conducted herein required combining information from the CFDA, as described below.

As previously discussed, the CFFR does not have all the information related to grant programs: grant type (formula or project grant), administering agencies and the categorical functions related to each program. Therefore, this information was obtained from the CFDA by crossreferencing the program unique identification number. Programs not listed in the Catalog were classified using USA.Spending.gov.

In order to develop a snapshot of federal grants awarded to Puerto Rico for FY 2010, programs were analyzed from various perspectives:

☐ To understand the flow and distribution of federal funds in Puerto Rico, a mapping of federal administering and local recipient agencies was developed.



To determine how Puerto Rico is positioned against other jurisdictions, grant programs
with obligations for FY 2010 were analyzed from three perspectives:

- 1) total number and funding amount of awarded to states,
- 2) average grants by state and
- 3) grants received in Puerto Rico.
- All of the three elements incorporate information regarding program participation¹⁷, obligations- both in general and per capita-, categorical functions, and federal administering agencies.
- ☐ Grants awarded to Puerto Rico were classified by recipient type (government, individuals, non-for profit, for profit, higher education organizations, and others¹8)
- □ By definition project grants are allocated based on a competitive process, therefore these may represent an opportunity for jurisdictions to capture additional funds. Thus, further analysis was performed specifically for this type of grants, as follows:
 - a. Jurisdictions were ranked based on their participation in competitive programs, total obligations, and per capita obligations.
 - b. Competitive programs were also analyzed based on categorical functions and federal administering agency.

Analysis of Federal Programs Opportunities for Puerto Rico based on Top Competitive Grant Programs:

☐ To determine top programs among states, two thresholds were established:

Program participation refers to the number of grant programs that each jurisdiction was awarded.

- 1. Competitive grant programs with the highest rate of participation among states (40 or more states), or prevalent programs.
- 2. Funding level obligations were grouped in statistical quartiles. The 4th quartile comprises programs with the highest level of funding.
- 3. Prevalent programs and programs that comprise the 4th quartile were combined, and resulted in top competitive grant programs.
- a. Once top programs were identified, Puerto Rico's participation was evaluated.
- b. Finally, those 118 programs were analyzed to determine programmatic priorities based on their categorical functions, administering agencies and recipient type.

Actors Involved in Federal Grant Management

Most federal grants are awarded to state governments, which then pass through grant funds to local entities, either private or public, by either a formula or a competitive process; this process is known as the federal grant pass-through (Keegan, 2012). In Puerto Rico, federal agencies, the Commonwealth, and the local agencies and entities are the main stakeholders in the pass-through process of the federal grants programs.





Nonetheless, the distribution of federal and local agencies varies. The table below shows the distribution of the local agencies and the federal agencies that administer funds awarded to the Commonwealth. The appendix section includes mapping diagrams for the top 8 Federal administering agencies.

The following graphs present the distribution of federal grants received in FY 2010 by federal administering agency¹⁹.

The "Administración de Desarrollo Socioeconómico de la Familia" and "Departamento de Educación" and the "Departamento de Salud" administered 59% of the grant funds received in FY 2010 (\$3,946 million). The University of Puerto Rico is the most diversified local entity in terms of federal administrating agencies (13).

ARRA had a great impact in terms of federal funds for Puerto Rico. The "Autoridad para el Financiamiento de la Vivienda", "Autoridad de Carreteras y Transportación" and "Administración de Vivienda Pública" received \$490 million as part of the ARRA funds, which represents 40% of total ARRA funds received in Puerto Rico for FY 2010. ARRA funds awarded to "Autoridad para el Financiamiento de la Vivienda" represent 65% of total funding of the agency for FY 2010. The situation for "Autoridad de Carreteras y Transportación" and "Administración de Vivienda Pública" is similar and ARRA funds represent 37% and 56%, respectively.




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Figure 8: Distribution of grants obligations by Puerto Rico's governmental entities

Grant Program Analysis

Overall Federal Assistance for all Jurisdictions

This section includes a quantitative analysis of the federal assistance programs for FY 2010. The CFFR covers federal government expenditures or obligations for the object categories listed below. For fiscal year 2010, total obligations²¹ totaled \$5.1 trillion, these are distributed as follows:

Insurance (\$1.3 trillion)
Retirement and disability (\$915 billion)
Other direct payments (\$819 billion)
Grants (\$683 billion)
Procurement contracts (\$517 billion)
Guaranteed or insured loans (\$427 billion)
Salaries and wages (\$343 billion)
Direct loans (\$88 billion)

Most of the federal government expenditures consist of retirement and disability payments (\$914,844 million), other direct payments (\$818,570 million) and grants (\$683,361 million).

Federal Government Obligations in Puerto Rico

Puerto Rico receives most of the federal assistance from grants and direct payments. Insurance programs are also substantial for the Island. Contrary to the states, funds from the PAN²² are classified as a direct payments for specified used, and therefore, included in the CFFR 2010 as a grant. On the other hand, the *Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program* (10.551) applicable to the states is considered a direct payments to individuals, thus, it is not classified as a grant program by the CFFR or any other source.

The Treasury Payment to Puerto Rico-Return of Taxes & Customs Duties Collected Program is another program which is particular to Puerto Rico. This program represents the reimbursement of the federal tax imposed to rum exports and its obligations for FY 2010 amounted to \$378 million. In the following sections, federal funds received in Puerto Rico are analyzed with and without considering the PAN and the Rum Tax Return for purposes of comparison with the states.

The following chart presents the distribution of federal assistance programs for the 50 states and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, by type of program, as listed in the CFFR 2010. As shown in the chart, the distribution by type of assistance among states presents a relative variation, thus, no particular trend is displayed. This is partially due to the socioeconomic and demographic differences among states.

According to the *Summary of Federal Programs Obligations by State and Outlying Area* (table below), Puerto Rico had significantly lower obligations when compared to the average obligations of the states. However, due to differences in the local endowments, obligations are further analyzed in a per capita basis.




Figure 9. Distribution of Federal Government Expenditure by State and by Type of Obligations (FY 2010)




Figure 10.Distribution of Federal Government Expenditure by State and by Type of Obligations (FY 2010)

Federal Grant Programs Distribution

In 2010, the CFFR listed a total of 1,346 federal programs classified as grants, of which 841 were classified as competitive programs (63%), and 174 as non-competitive programs (13%); the remaining 24% consists of cooperative agreement programs²³, and direct payment grants programs.

It was estimated that states participate in an average of 592 Federal grant programs. The states average distribution of federal grant programs indicate that competitive programs represent 61%, whereas non-competitive grants represent 24%. This distribution is similar to that of total grant programs.

Distribution of Grant Programs Based of 2010 CFDA Categories




Puerto Rico Grant Program Participation

According to the CFFR, 2010, Puerto Rico participated in 380 grant programs²⁴ which represent \$6,313 million. Competitive grants represent 56% of total grants received, while 32% of these grants were non-competitive. The rest of the grants derive from cooperative agreements, direct payment grants and other programs.




Figure 13 Distribution of the Federal Grants Programs in Puerto Rico

Distribution of Grant Obligations

A total of \$670,700²⁵ million were awarded through the federal grant programs in 2010. The non-competitive programs represent 65% of grant obligations or \$433,191 million, while competitive grants comprise 30% or \$201,934 million.

For FY 2010 grant obligations added up to \$683,361 million. The District of Columbia, and the territories of American Samoa, Fed. States of Micronesia, Guam, Marshall Islands, Northern Marianas, Palau, and the US Virgin Islands were excluded from this analysis.



In FY 2010, Puerto Rico had obligations in 479 federal programs; of which 380 where grant programs.

illustrates the average distribution of grant obligations received for FY2010, by category. The average distributions to states followed a similar pattern: non-competitive programs represent 61%, whereas competitive grants represent 33%²⁶.




Figure 15 Distribution of the Average Grant Funds by States based on the Program Categories (Fiscal Year-2010)

The average was calculated using the same approach to calculate the average distribution for the number of programs. The ratio is the product of dividing the type of obligations by the total funds of grants received by each state.




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Distribution of Grant Obligations for Puerto Rico

The distribution of the funds awarded to Puerto is different from total grants and the average distributions, mostly due to the classification of the PAN as a grant.

Considering PAN in the analysis, non-competitive obligations represent a 39% or \$2,472 million, while competitive programs add up to \$964 million or 15%. If the PAN funds are not considered, the distribution is closer to the average distribution of the states, where funds from competitive programs represent 24%.

Per capita comparison between Puerto Rico and the States

For FY 2010, the states received an average of \$2,352 in federal grants per capita²⁷. The states with the highest per capita obligations in grants were Alaska, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Vermont and Wyoming.

For the same period, Puerto Rico received an average of \$1,695 in federal funds per capita and it is ranked 47 among the states. Without the PAN the per capita of Federal grants received was \$1,084, placing the Island in last place when compared against the states grants funds per capita. Nevada ranks number 50 and receives \$1,370 grants funds per capita.

Figure 17: Federal Grants Obligations per Capita per State







Figure 18: Grant Appropriations Per Capita Amounts by State by Program Category




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Federal Grants by Functional Categories

As mentioned before, programs in the Catalog provide a wide range of benefits and services, which are grouped into 20 basic functional categories. This section presents the results of the analysis of grant programs with obligations for FY 2010 by functional category.


The following graph shows the distribution of grant program obligations by functional category and assistance type. Programs related to social and food services and health received most of its funding through formula grants, while programs related to disaster prevention and relief, science and technology, and information and statistics received must funds from competitive grants. Finally, programs related to housing were mostly funded through direct payments (Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers).



As shown in the graph below, Puerto Rico obligations follow the same pattern as total obligations. Most programs related to food and nutrition services received funds through



formula grants, while programs related to science and technology and information and statistics received must funds from competitive grants. Finally, programs related to housing were funded through direct payments (Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers).



Cooperative agreement programs, in the education functional category were not considered in this analysis since the net obligation was negative.

As shown in the graph below, most of the block and formula grants focus on income security, social services and health programs, such as the Medical Assistance Program. This program had the largest amount of obligations (\$284,016 million) which represents 42.3%

of total grant obligations for FY 2010. In second place is the Temporary Assistance for Needy Family (TANF) program with \$16,639 million in obligations for the same year.




Figure 21. Grant Program Obligations by Functional Area FY 2010

On the other hand, most of the competitive grants obligations for FY 2010, were concentrated in health related programs. In this category, the program with the highest obligations is the State Children Insurance Program with \$10,926 million. This program has a combined fund allocation methodology that includes formula and competitive distribution.

Transportation is the second functional category with most obligations for FY 2010. In this area the program with highest obligations is the Highway Planning and Construction Program with grant obligations of \$46,387 million. This program also uses a combined fund allocation methodology.

Puerto Rico

The following figure shows that most of the competitive grant programs obligations for Puerto Rico, in FY 2010, are related to health and transportation. The Head Start Program has the largest amount of competitive grants obligations with \$214 million and impacts the functional categories of health, education, income security and social services, and information and statistics. The Highway Planning and Construction Program is in second place, with competitive obligations of \$133 million. This program impacts transportation and disaster prevention and relief.






Figure 22. Puerto Rico Grant Programs Obligations by Functional Area FY 2010

Because the PAN is considered a grant for Puerto Rico, non-competitive obligations are concentrated in income security and social services. If the PAN is not considered, most non-competitive obligations are related to health and education. Top programs in terms of obligations for FY 2010 are: 1) Medicaid with \$377 million and impacts health and income security; and 2) Title I - Grants to Local Education Agencies with \$299 million and impacts education. ²⁹

Federal Grants by Administering Agency

Grant programs listed in the CFFR 2010 were also cross-referenced to the awarding agency based on the CFDA.




Figure 23. Grants Program Distribution by Federal Administering Agency (Fiscal Year 2010)

As shown in the graph above, of the 1,346 grant programs listed in the CFFR 2010, 823 are concentrated in the following federal agencies, which represent (61%):

- ☐ Department of Health and Human Services (255 programs)
- □ Department of the Interior (195 programs)
- □ Department of Education (145 programs)
- ☐ Department of Agriculture (132 programs)
- ☐ Environmental Protection Agency (96 programs)

In terms of grant obligations for the states in FY 2010, the HHS was responsible for 60% (\$404,692 million), of which 81% were allocated as formula grants. The major program administered by HHS is the *Medical Assistance Program (93.778)*. This program awarded

\$284,017 million for FY 2010 and represents, 42% of the total obligations awarded in grants to the states.

The Department of Transportation managed \$63,377 million in grants, while the Department of Education administered \$57,333 million, and together they account for 18% of grant obligations for FY 2010. Most grant programs administered by the Department of Transportation (88%) are competitive and account for \$55,949 of grant programs obligations managed by this agency. On the other hand, \$45,233 of the obligations administered by the Department of Education, are distributed using formula based allocations (79%).




Figure 24: Federal Administering Agency Distribution of Federal Obligations (Fiscal Year 2010)

In Puerto Rico, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) was responsible for the administration of 29% of grants programs awarded (112). Most of the grants programs administered by HHS (47%) are competitive, while 38% used formula allocations. The

Department of Education is in second place, in terms of grant programs administered, with 49 programs. Most of these programs (57%) have formula based allocation methods.




Figure 25: Federal Grants Programs in Puerto Rico by Administering Agency (Fiscal Year 2010)

Regarding FY 2010 grant obligations, the Department of Agriculture was responsible for the administration of 44% of the \$6,313 million awarded to Puerto Rico. Of these \$2,772 million, 82% are PAN's obligations. If the PAN is excluded, HHS and Department of Education were accountable for 52% of the \$4,040 million of grants funds awarded to Puerto Rico. The programs with the highest funding administered by these agencies were the 93.778 Medical Assistance Program and 84.010 Title I Grants to Local Education Agencies, respectively.

In Puerto Rico, 57% of the \$1,292 grant funds administered by HHS, as well as, 91% of the \$809 million managed by the Department of Education, were distributed using formula grants




Figure 26: Federal Administering Agency Distribution of Federal Grants Obligations in Puerto Rico (Fiscal Year 2010)

Federal Grants by Recipient Type

Recipients of the federal grant programs include both, public and private organizations, as well as individuals. Based on the objective and requirements of each program, federal grants are awarded to certain types of recipients. Since CFFR does not provide information regarding grant recipients, for this analysis, USAspending.gov was the source used to identify the recipient types in Puerto Rico for FY 2010³⁰.

The FY 2010 database from USAspending is different from CFFR, in terms of grants classification; therefore there are discrepancies in the number of Federal grant programs and obligations. For this analysis, 329 grant programs are considered: 325 programs classified as grant programs in USA. Spending and 4 programs classified as direct payments were included, since they are grants for the CFFR.



According to USAspeding.gov, recipients can be classified into six main categories: 1) for-profit organization, 2) government, 3) higher education organization, 4) individual³¹, 5) non-profit organization and 6) others.

The next two tables present grant program participation and funds awarded by recipient type for FY 2010.

In 2010, the government had the greatest participation in grants programs with a total of 229. Most of the programs are non-competitive (53%). Higher education organizations were in second place, participating in 76 programs, of which 89% were competitive programs. In third place are non-profit organizations with 48 programs, mostly competitive (88%).

In terms of funds awarded in FY 2010, governmental entities received the highest amount with \$5,001,634,116, mostly from non-competitive programs (94%). On the other hand, higher education and non-profits organizations received most of the funds awarded from competitive programs. For FY 2010, competitive grants awarded to individuals show net deobligations of \$1,764,112.

Individual – the designation comes from the government's FAADS database and refers to a person who receives federal assistance as an entity independent of any public or private institution. Examples of this type of spending would be social security retirement insurance payments to citizens, payments to individuals qualifying for food stamps, and other individual payments (USAspending.gov, 2013).



The following graph shows the rate of participation of each recipient type in formula and competitive grant programs. The rate of participation of for profit business in federal grants programs is very limited. For FY 2010, these organizations accessed only nine programs and received \$30,333,483, of which 87% is derived from competitive programs. Puerto Rico is placed in number 43. Top recipients, in terms of for profit organizations, are California (\$1,921,105,398), Florida (\$1,329,886,934), Illinois (\$1,111,980,865), Texas (\$1,054,340,550), and Pennsylvania (\$1,010,528,623).

Ranking Based Competitive Programs

Puerto Rico and the states were ranked based on their participation in competitive grant programs for FY 2010. The exercise considered the percentage of competitive programs, total obligations, and per capita³² obligations for competitive grant programs FY 2010.

When compared to the 50 states, Puerto Rico is 51st place, in terms of its participation on competitive programs. The Island participated in 214 competitive programs, out of 841³³ competitive grant programs with obligations for FY 2010. In average, states participated in 365 of those programs. The states with the highest participation rate in competitive grant programs were California, New York, Texas, Washington, Massachusetts and Virginia.

Based on Puerto Rico's program participation,³⁴ in FY 2010, the ratio of competitive programs is 56%, which positioned the Island in number 49, while the average ratio for the states is 61%. This analysis is based on programs that awarded funds to states during FY 2010 and it does not consider eligibility. This means that the Island is not as diversified as the states in terms of accessing competitive grants that are available for US territories.

Puerto Rico's competitive grant programs obligations for FY 2010 total \$963,693,569; this puts the Island in 47th place. The states with the highest competitive grant obligations were California (\$23,250,183,932), New York (\$13,445,667,024), Texas (\$12,037,637,940), Massachusetts (\$9,613,958,168) and Pennsylvania (\$7,952,306,011).

Considering the PAN, obligations from competitive grant programs represent 15% of total grants funds awarded to Puerto Rico during FY 2010, placing the Island in the last position (51). If PAN is excluded, competitive grant programs add up to 24%.

The Per Capita measure was used as basis to compare the relative level of obligations between Puerto Rico and the States. The Per Capita by program was calculated by adding the obligations received per participating state divided by the total population of the participating states, as presented in the in the CFFR for FY 2010.

This number is based on all competitive programs with obligations for FY 2010 and does not consider eligibility for the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

In terms of per capita obligations for competitive grant programs, Puerto Rico placed number 51 (\$259); Florida ranks in 50th place with per capita obligations of \$401. The top recipients, in terms of per capita competitive grant obligations are Alaska (\$2,386), North Dakota (\$1,785), Vermont (\$1,586), Massachusetts (\$1,468) and Montana (\$1,394).

The following tables summarize the results of the ranking exercises. The first one provides information about competitive grant program participation and obligations by state, in terms of total and per capita amounts. The second table shows the ratio of competitive programs to total programs, and obligation amounts based on program participation.



Competitive Grant Programs per Functional Categories

This section discusses the distribution of competitive grants programs by functional category for FY 2010. Grant programs are classified into 20 categories organized by the policy goals that Federal government is trying to achieve. Most programs are classified under one or more functional categories, which mean that grant programs usually impact more than one programmatic area³⁵. However, not all competitive programs in 2010 were classified under these functional areas³⁶.

For FY 2010, the functional categories with the highest amount of competitive grant programs were *Education; Health; Environmental Quality; Law, Justice and Legal Services; Natural Resources; and* Agricultural.



There were 208 from the 821 competitive programs that were not classified per functional area. For the analysis of the total competitive programs, 633 programs were classified based on CFDA.



The data from the CFDA, CFFR, or USAspending.gov does not provide the level of detail to determine the allocation of the obligations based on functional areas. CFDA classification is limited to program level. Therefore, the analysis was conducted based on the assumption of an equitable distribution of programs per functional category.

Compared to the states, Puerto Rico had minimum participation in the Environmental Quality and Natural Resources functional areas, which represent 15.3% of the total competitive programs. The Island did not participate in 28 programs in the Environmental Quality and 3 in the Natural Resources categories, for which it was eligible to participate as US Territory, according to information in the CFDA. Based on the per capita of those programs, the maximum opportunity was \$ \$27,828,269.71.³⁷

OGP should contact local agencies related to those functional categories, such as the *Departamento de Recursos Naturales*, *Junta Calidad Ambiental*, among others, to explore the alternative and submit proposals for project grants in the future.




Figure 29: Distribution of Competitive Programs by Functional Area- Puerto Rico Competitive Programs for FY2010

As showed in the previous graph, for FY 2010 Puerto Rico received most of the competitive grants funds (65%) from the *Health; Education; Agricultural; Income Security; and Law, Justice and Legal Services* functional categories³⁸.

Puerto Rico participated in 52 competitive programs that were not classified by functional areas in the 2010 CFDA. Therefore, the analysis of the federal grants by functional area was based on 162 competitive programs.



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This information is based on eligibility per CFDA and does not consider information for each funding opportunity that might be listed in grants.gov and in corresponding CFR with different eligibility parameters. The Per Capita by program was calculated by adding the obligations received per participating state divided by the total population of the participating states, as presented in the in the CFFR for FY 2010..

In terms of competitive grant obligations for Puerto Rico, the following categorical functions received the largest amounts: *Health, Disaster Prevention and Relief; Transportation; Education; Energy; Income Security and Social Services*. Together these categories represent 71% of total obligations for the competitive grants categorized in the CFDA. These categories are also the top five in terms of the average obligations per state FY 2010.




Figure 30. Distribution of Competitive Programs Obligations by Functional Area

For Puerto Rico, the *Information and Statistics* category represents 6% of the obligations of the competitive grants categorized in the CFDA, while for the states it only comprises 1%. The difference is mostly due to the *Head Start Program*.

As shown in the next table, Puerto Rico had little participation in competitive grant programs categorized under the functional areas of *Transportation and Disaster Prevention and Relief during* FY 2010, when compared with the average and per capita obligations for the states. This shows that states are more aggressive in terms of accessing competitive grant programs.

In 2010, Puerto Rico did not participate in six competitive grants programs in the Disaster Prevention and Relief and 5 of the Transportation category, even though it was listed as an eligible applicant (US territories) as per the CFDA. Based on the per capita obligations, the funding opportunity for these programs in 2010 was \$2,877,262 and \$51,284,831, respectively.

The program that could represent the biggest opportunity in terms of additional funds in Transportation is the *Federal Transit-Capital Investment Grants* program. Based on participating states, this program had a per capita of \$13.25 for 2010 and uses a combined allocation method (formula and project grants).³⁹ In 2010, Puerto Rico did participate in the formula grant segment of this program.

The local federal funds office should not limit its participation in federal grant programs to formula grants. In order to maximize funding opportunities, it should monitor all funding opportunities in the CFDA and grants.gov, considering all the available types of grants, including project and cooperative agreements.

For FY 2010, the agencies that administered the greater amount of competitive programs were the Department of Health and Human Services (152), Department of Education (107) and the Department of Agriculture (91).

Puerto Rico Competitive Grants FY 2010

During FY 2010, Puerto Rico participated in 53 competitive programs administrated by the Department of Health and Human Services that represents 25% of total competitive programs, 21 competitive programs administered by the Department of Education and 28 project grants managed by the Department of Agriculture.




Figure 34. Federal Administering Agency Distribution of Competitive Grants
Programs in Puerto Rico (Fiscal Year 2010)


In terms of competitive grant obligations for Puerto Rico in FY 2010, the HHS is responsible for the administration of \$530 million, which represent 55% of the total of competitive funds received. HHS manages two programs that amount to 32% of competitive funds awarded to Puerto Rico.

- 1. Program number 93.600 *Head Start* that accounts for 22% and awarded \$214 million in competitive grant funds
- 2. Program number 93.767 *State Children's Insurance Program* (CHIP) that accounts for 12% and awarded \$117 million (12%)

In addition, the Department of Transportation administered \$157 million or 16% of the competitive funds received for 2010. The Department of Commerce, Department of Education, and the Department of Energy managed another 15% of the competitive funds awarded to Puerto Rico (\$143 million).

The graph below illustrates the average distribution of the competitive obligations for the 50 states, based on the administering federal agencies⁴⁰. In average, more than half of the obligations (61%) were administrated by the HHS and the Department of Transportation (DOT).




Figure 36 Average competitive programs by Federal Agency

Analysis of Federal Programs Opportunities for Puerto Rico

This section presents a preliminary assessment of competitive programs where Puerto Rico had no participation for FY 2010, based on the assumptions explained below. The analysis has the objective of providing an overview of grant opportunities that Puerto Rico may have access to, considering areas of impact - based on categorical functions - and main stakeholders, such as administering agencies and fund recipients.

As described in the methodology section, this assessment is focused on the competitive grant programs, as published in the CFFR 2010 and data from the CFDA. It examines Puerto Rico's participation in project grant programs, using a tri-dimensional approach that evaluates the Commonwealth's:

- ☐ To determine top programs among states, two thresholds were established:
 - Programs with the highest rate of participation among states (40 or more states)
 resulting in 208 grant programs
 - 2) Funding level obligations were grouped in statistical quartiles. The 4th quartile comprise of 211 programs which have the highest level of funding for FY 2010.
- ☐ Once top programs were identified, Puerto Rico's participation was evaluated
- ☐ Finally, programs were analyzed to determine programmatic priorities based on their categorical functions, administering agencies and recipient type. Eligibility for the Commonwealth was determined based on information available in the CFDA in terms of US territories eligibility and for entities in the private sector.



Prevalent Competitive Grant Programs

For FY 2010, a total of 841 competitive grant programs were listed in the CFFR. Of these competitive grant programs, 208 awarded funds to 40 states or more. Prevalent competitive grant programs⁴¹ had \$174,370 million in obligations. These obligations account for 86.9% of the \$201,934 million awarded by competitive grant programs for all states, and 25% of the total obligations for FY 2010.

The analysis shows that, of the 208 prevalent competitive grant programs, 70 awarded funds to all the states, including Puerto Rico and had total obligations of \$96,930 million. On average, states participated in 196 of the popular competitive programs (94%).

Moreover, states with a higher rate of participation in competitive programs, received a lower percentage of grant funds from the prevalent programs. This reflects that some states are more diversified in terms of their participation in competitive grant programs, and thus, do not limit their participation to popular programs.

For instance, for FY 2010, Maryland participated in 683 grant programs, of which 440 are competitive. Those competitive grant programs represent 47.52% of total grants funds received. This ranks Maryland in 3rd place. Of those project grants, 203 are among the popular programs (46%). Maryland received \$5,059 million from the prevalent competitive grants, which represents 74% of its competitive grant funds. This places Maryland in the 50th position, when compared to other states, which highlights that Maryland has been able to capture a more diversified set of federal funds through competitive grants.

On the other hand, Kentucky participated in 567 grant programs, of which 352 are competitive (62%). Those competitive programs represent 24.45% of grants funds received. This places Kentucky in 48th place. This state received \$2,096,489,660 from popular competitive programs,

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which represents 90%⁴² of competitive obligations. This places Kentucky in number 19, when compared to other states. Thus, Kentucky participates in most of the popular competitive grant programs.

Puerto Rico's Participation in Prevalent Competitive Programs

In 2010, Puerto Rico participated in 214 competitive programs, 152 of which are prevalent grant programs. The total obligation from the popular programs was approximately \$902 million or 94% of the competitive grant funds awarded to Puerto Rico. The Commonwealth should consider broadening the range of competitive grant programs in which it participates to include those programs that are not popular in terms of state participation.

The Island had a 73% participation rate in prevalent competitive programs, which is the lower among the states. Based on CFFR 2010, Puerto Rico did not participated in 56 of the popular competitive programs that awarded an average of \$611 million per state. According to CFDA, US Territories are eligible to participate in 19 of those programs. There are 24 additional programs where non-profit organizations may participate.

<u>Participation based on Level of Funding of the Competitive Grants</u> <u>Programs</u>

The analysis on funding level was conducted by grouping total amounts of funds awarded by the competitive grant programs in statistical quartiles⁴³. The distribution was then segregated in the following statistically significant ranges:

This 90% is above the average of 86.9%.

⁴³ A quartile is one of three points that divide a data set into four equal groups, each representing a fourth of the distributed sampled population. 43 programs reflected a net deobligation for FY2010 per CFFR.



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The next table shows the number of programs and obligations by state and statistical quartile. The fourth quartile comprises the highest level of funding. This means that 4% of the competitive grants awards come from 630 programs which had obligations up to \$53,047,983 (quartiles 1 thru 3), while 96% of the obligations derives from the 211 programs in quartile 4, which groups substantially higher obligations.

Of the 211 competitive grant programs in the 4th quartile, Puerto Rico only participated in 114 and received \$925 million, while average obligations for the fourth quartile ascend to \$3,878 million. As shown in the table below, Puerto Rico is below average in terms of program participation and funds received from the competitive programs that comprise 96% of competitive grant obligations for FY 2010.

Top Competitive Grant Programs Analysis

Prevalent programs and programs that comprise 96% of competitive grant obligations for FY 2010 add up to 419. There were some programs that overlapped, and thus the net amount is 285 top competitive grant programs.

After our analysis, it was concluded that Puerto Rico did not participated in 118 of those programs.⁴⁴ In FY 2010, obligations for the 118 top programs that did not awarded funds to Puerto Rico, add up to \$49,991 million. Those programs have a per capita award of \$584 for participating states. The following graph compares the distribution of the obligations for those programs with Puerto Rico's competitive programs obligations by functional area.

Eligibility for those 118 was verified based on information published in the CFDA. Based on this, Puerto Rico is eligible to participate in 31 as a US Territory. In addition there are various programs that are eligible for private organizations, but are not identified as eligible for territories: higher education organizations⁴⁵ are eligible for 3 programs, while non-profits are eligible to participate in 21 and there are 12 programs available for profit businesses).

Analysis of Top Programs Opportunities for Puerto Rico⁴⁶ by Functional Area

Obligations of the top programs where Puerto Rico did not participated in FY 2010⁴⁷, focus on Health (22%); Education (23%); Income Security and Social Services (12%); Energy (16%); Community Development (8%); and Transportation (8%).

Opportunities refer to the top competitive grant programs where Puerto Rico had no participation for FY 2010.



Data from the OGP and USAspending indicates that 14 of the 118 programs had obligations for Puerto Rico in 2010. The table in the appendix section indicates which programs had obligations in USAspending and/or OGP.

These are programs listed in the Catalog that specify eligibility code 42-Higher Education (includes Research). Nonetheless, most programs that are eligible for non-profit organizations include higher education entities as eligible applicants.




Figure 37: Distribution of Competitive Obligations by Functional Area (Puerto Rico Participation versus Potential Obligations)

As shown in the graph above, Education, Health, and Income Security and Social Services are the top functional categories for Puerto Rico, in terms of competitive obligations. Nonetheless, there may be additional opportunities within those categories. Moreover, Puerto Rico had few obligations from competitive programs in the areas of Energy and Community Development.

The energy sector includes 5 competitive programs that may represent an opportunity for Puerto Rico, with total obligations of \$6,762 million and per capita of \$22.14 for participating states. 94% of the obligations in the energy sector are concentrated in two programs administered by the Department of Energy:

81.087 Renewable Energy Research and Development

81.122 Electricity Delivery and Energy Reliability, Research, Development and Analysis

According to CFDA, Puerto Rico is not eligible as a US territory, nonetheless, private organizations as well as higher education entities may be eligible to obtain grant through these programs.

There are eight opportunity programs classified under the Community Development category. Those programs had total obligations of \$7,019 million, of which 91% were allocated between two programs.

10.787 Broadband Initiatives Program – Recovery

20.500 Federal Transit-Capital Investment Grants

Programs 10.787 and 20.500 provide funds to other functional areas that include Business and Commerce, Regional Development, and Transportation. According to CFDA, Puerto Rico is only eligible as a US territory in one program *Assistance to Firefighters Grant*, nonetheless, private organizations as well as higher education entities may be eligible to obtain grant through these programs.

As shown in the table above, programs related to Community Development are administered by diverse federal agencies. Therefore, local agencies responsible for the implementation of programmatic goals related to community development should not concentrate their efforts to identify additional sources of federal funds in only one agency, for instance in the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Analysis of Top Programs Opportunities for Puerto Rico by Administering Agency

Similar to distribution of total grants programs and competitive programs by federal agency, the HHS is responsible for the administration of 33% of total obligations awarded for the 118 competitive programs where Puerto Rico did not participated in FY 2010. The Department of Education and Department of Energy were responsible of 28% of the total obligations.




Figure 38: Distribution of Potential Competitive Obligations by Administrative Federal Agency (Puerto Rico Participation versus Potential Obligations of Competitive Programs)

The Department of Education accounted for 20 of the 118 competitive programs with total obligations \$7,536 million. Two of these programs were part of the State Fiscal Stabilization Fund (SFSF)⁴⁸ and awarded \$4,843 million to the participating states and non-profit entities. According to CFFR 2010, Puerto Rico did not receive any funds from those programs.

The State Fiscal Stabilization Fund (SFSF) program is a new one-time appropriation of \$53.6 billion under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA).

From the 118 top competitive programs that may represent additional al funding opportunities for Puerto Rico, the CFDA specified that US Territories are eligible to participate in 31 programs In addition there are various programs that are eligible for non-governmental entities such as higher education organizations⁴⁹ which are eligible to participate in 3 programs, while non-profits are eligible to participate in 21 and there are 12 programs available for profit businesses.

To determine Puerto Rico's eligibility, a thorough investigation of several sources is required, since not all programs are listed in the CFDA. In addition, each program establishes eligibility criteria based on the programmatic needs and priorities that Congress and administrative agencies had intended to address.

These are programs listed in the Catalog that specify eligibility code 42-Higher Education (includes Research). Nonetheless, most programs that are eligible for non-profit organizations include higher education entities as eligible applicants.




Puerto Rico Deobligations FY 2010

As discussed earlier, deobligations are downward adjustments of the obligations recorded in a prime contract or assistance award. It is caused by factors such as (1) termination of a part of the project, (2) return of unspent funds, or (3) correction of reported amounts (USAspending.gov).

The following illustration shows the total amount of competitive grant programs that had deobligations for FY 2010, per the CFFR and USAspending.gov. Deobligations reported in the latter (\$192,325,557) are considerably higher than those reported in the CFFR (\$11,565,794)⁵⁰. This may be due to the fact that USAspending is constantly being updated, while the CFFR is a snapshot as of the time data was originally compiled.

When compared with the 50 states, in terms of deobligations, Puerto Rico is in second place. Florida is in first place with deobligations of \$42,429,548 for 2010, which represents 1% of grants received. South Carolina (\$15,265,623), Delaware (\$7,437,006), and Hawaii (\$7,426,523) complete the top five.

Conclusions

Although there are various sources of information regarding federal funds, there are
discrepancies in information reported. Moreover, data available to determine Puerto
Rico's eligibility is not consistent, which presents a bigger challenge for the
Commonwealth to identify and take advantage of new funding opportunities.

- States and jurisdictions received \$5,024 billion in federal funds in FY 2010, while Puerto Rico received \$29,121 million.
- □ In terms of the distribution of grant funds by type of program, states in the overall received a total of \$670,700⁵¹ million in 2010. Non-competitive program funds represented 65%, while competitive grants comprised 30%. The remaining 5% is distributed among cooperative agreements, direct payments and other programs.
- □ Puerto Rico receives most of its federal assistance from direct payments for individuals (\$12,336 million) and grants (\$6,313 million). Insurance payments are in third place with \$5,605 million.
- Puerto Rico receives 32% of its grant funds from competitive grant programs, thus ranks 49 out of 51 jurisdictions, in terms of participation in competitive grant programs. This suggests that there is an area of opportunity for Puerto Rico to received additional funding through project grants.
- □ The difference between Puerto Rico and the tendency of the states is partly due to the PAN, which is classified as a grant for Puerto Rico, not direct payment as elsewhere, and awarded \$2,272,million in 2010.

For FY 2010 grant obligations added up to \$683,361 million. For this analysis, the District of Columbia, and the territories of American Samoa, Fed. States of Micronesia, Guam, Marshall Islands, Northern Marianas, Palau, and the US Virgin Islands were excluded.



- □ For FY 2010, the states received an average of \$2,352 in federal funds per capita ⁵². Per capita grant obligations for Puerto Rico \$1,695 is considerably lower when compared with that of the states; this ranks the Island at number 47. If the PAN is excluded from the grant analysis, Puerto Rico will be ranked in last place, with a per capita grant obligation of \$1,084.44. ⁵³. The states with the highest per capita obligations in grants were Alaska, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Vermont and Wyoming.
- □ Since the majority of federal grant obligations for Puerto Rico in FY 2010 derive from formula grants, it can be inferred that the limited amount of awards from project-based allocations could be one the explanations for the difference between the average per capita amount of federal funds of the states and that of Puerto Rico.
- □ Per the CFFR, federal grants obligations for Puerto Rico (excluding PAN funds) are concentrated in the Department of Health and Human Services (32%) and the Department of Education (20%). In terms of competitive grants Department of Health and Human Services and the Department of Transportation managed 61% of funds awarded.
- Based on CFFR 2010, Puerto Rico did not participated in 118 of the top⁵⁴ competitive programs that awarded an average of \$1,000 million per state. These might represent additional funding opportunities, although there may be some eligibility limitations for some programs, due to the Island political status.

Top competitive programs, for the purposes of this report, refer to programs that awarded funds to 40 states or more and had the largest awards (4th quartile) for FY 2010.

Recommendations

- Because of the lack of uniform information related to the Commonwealth eligibility to participate in discretionary and project grants available, Puerto Rico's federal funds office should establish liaisons with top administering agencies.
- Due to the discrepancies among the different Federal Assistance Programs databases, the OMB shall consider the implementation of a data governance system. This includes an adequate monitoring system of the Federal Grants available, as well as a compliance division to ensure proper and timely use of funds awarded.
- ☐ The process of identifying federal grant opportunities should integrate both federal and local agencies and their programmatic priorities to improve the chances to receive money from competitive funds. Consider all the stages of the life cycle process to ensure that monitoring capability would be available.
- □ Whereas federal agencies manage funds of various program areas, local agencies should not concentrate their efforts to identify additional sources of funding in only one agency, for example in the Department of Housing and Urban Development for community development priorities.
- ☐ The Federal Transit-Capital Investment Grants program, which has a \$13.25 per capita, should be monitored closely since it might represent a material opportunity in terms of additional funding. This program provides funds for Transportation and Community Development.
- ☐ The Commonwealth should establish a plan to broaden the range of competitive grant programs in which it participates to include those programs that are not popular in terms of state participation. These efforts should take into account that some programs have limited appropriations, and therefore a limited amount of recipients.



In order to maximize the impact of federal grants in Puerto Rico, the Office of Management
and Budget must consider, not only programs with high participation among the states and
large awards, but also diversify its participation in federal grant programs.
Assess the ability of local agencies to administer additional grant programs due to the
inherent costs of managing and administering grant programs. For instance, many programs
have matching requirements and maintenance of efforts requirements, among others.
These pre-requisites to federal funds require a thorough analysis and assessment of state
agencies and fund recipients.
Consider capacity building agreements with relevant federal administering agencies, once
local capacity in top programs has been established.
The local federal funds office should not limit its participation in federal programs to
formula grants. In order to maximize funding, it should monitor all funding opportunities in
the CFDA and grants.gov, considering all the available types of grants, including project and
cooperative agreements.
Since more than 60% of top competitive grant programs where Puerto Rico had no awards
for 2010, are also available to the private sector (per CFDA), the Commonwealth should
consider establishing specific support mechanisms for non-profit and for profit
organizations that could potentially participate in federal grants programs.
Assess areas of opportunity in the Environmental Quality, Transportation, Natural
Resources and Community Development, according to the Commonwealth programmatic
priorities and grant management capabilities.
Cross-reference program objectives with local agencies and federal priorities and also with
impact areas of non-governmental entities.




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
Mapping of the Department of Health and Human Services with Puerto Rico's entities




Mapping of the Department of the Interior with Puerto Rico's entities

Mapping of the Department of Agriculture with Puerto Rico's entities






Mapping of the Environmental Protection Agency with Puerto Rico's entities






Figure 40: Mapping of the Department of Homeland Security with Puerto Rico's entities


Distribution of Federal Grants Program Categories by States








